They dressed up and experienced life as a soldier travelling to the Crimea and finished the day dressing up as Florence herself, along with her nurses and injured soldiers in a wonderful set up of a hospital in Scutari.

Acorn Class

Pre-School have been looking at Halloween and fireworks this month. We carved a pumpkin and saved the seeds to plant in the Spring. We also made firework pictures and rockets.



We have learnt the nursery rhymes Jack and Jill, Hickory Dickory Dock, Head, Shoulders, Knees and Toes, Row Row Row your Boat and The Wheels on the Bus for our Nursery Rhyme challenge week, where we learnt the rhymes and did some fun activities. Yew class have met their new buddies in Reception. Over the past couple of weeks, on Wednesday mornings, the children have shared a range of activities. Willow Class

October has been a busy month in Willow class as we settled into our routines, enjoyed new learning in all our different subjects and completed poetry linked to Black History Month.

One of our favourite days has been our trip to Batchworth Lock Canal Centre in Rickmansworth. We spent the day doing a variety of activities that have helped our understanding of the Industrial Revolution and what life would have been like on the canal in Victorian times. Travelling up and down the canal on a narrow boat was one of our highlights as we spotted wildlife and other boats as well as how to stay safe on board – especially when going into a lock.

It was very exciting to go into Batchworth Lock itself and experience how the boat would move up or downhill along the canal by being raised and lowered in the lock; this was made even better by the fact that it was children in our class who were manning the lock!



We also got to see a historic narrow boat which showed us a glimpse of life on board for boat dwellers over a century ago and we had the chance to dress up and re-enact some of the working roles of people building and using the canals in the Victorian times. The children used a pickaxe and wheelbarrow to role play digging out the canals, and 'puddling' the clay – stamping it down to help line the bottom of the canal. They then experienced 'wash day' where they scrubbed clothes with a bar of soap and a metal board, then used a wooden 'dolly' and a mangle, before hanging them up to dry.

Ash Class

Throughout November we have been thinking about Autumn and celebrations. We have been exploring for signs of Autumn and have made some super leaf men from the leaves we found. We have also designed and constructed homes for our own hedgehogs to stay warm during the Winter



For Fireworks Night, we made explosive firework pictures, adding sound writing to these and compared now and then for the present and the time Guy Fawkes lived.

For Diwali, we have made different Rangoli patterns, danced to the story of Rama and Sita and investigated reflective materials with torches. We have selected these materials to create our own stars to shine in the classroom. In Literacy we have planned our own stories, based upon The Star in the Jar story, and written some short sentences.

In maths we have looked at different shapes and subitising numbers up to five.





Beech Class

Our Year 1 children have been very busy this month, learning to add and subtract using Rek-en-Reks and other manipulatives, as well as developing their mental maths skills.



In Computing, they have enjoyed learning about Algorithms, Input and Output devices and Virtual Assistants. We needed to fully understand this using other resources first before we could move onto trying it out on the computers.



Fir Class

The Year 3 children have particularly enjoyed their Design Technology learning finding out that fruits and vegetables grow in different countries based on their climates. They found out about foods that are seasonal to the United Kingdom and how they grow in a particular season rather than all year round and how this can have a positive effect on the environment. They have learned how to use peelers, graters and vegetable knives safely. They then had the opportunity to design and make their own seasonal fruit tart and then eat them!





Redwood Class

This half term we've been doing a lot of music! In Computing, we've been learning how to code our own soundtracks for the book we're reading in English - we've had to think about volume, instruments, speed... And in Music, we've been looking at the history of Blues music as we start learning how to recreate the 12-bar blues!



Forest School

This month we have been super busy in Forest School. Pre-School have been learning about hibernation while Reception made leaf ghosts and a giant poppy. Year 1 made wands and Year 2 & Year 3 made poppies out of leaves and wood cookies which gave us the opportunity to discuss why we wear poppies this time of year. Year 4 have been making Autumn mandalas and Year 6, Yew class, have been making scented candles.





We would like to say goodbye to Mrs Bell, our School Business Manager, who will be leaving Overstone on 15th December. In the 18 months Mrs Bell has been at the school she has worked very hard with staff and governors as well as being a friendly face on the gate. Mrs Bell is moving to become the School Business Manager at a secondary school and we wish her well in her new role.
