- Implementing our school values which have clear and agreed statements, as well as ensuring that the children know their rights and respect the rights of others.
- Through the PSHE and RE curriculums pupils are encouraged to discuss and respect differences between people.
- Respect for each other is modelled by all staff towards the pupils and each other.
- Respect covers self-respect, respect for family, friends, and other groups; the school, the locality, the environment, and possessions
- Children's behaviours around the school demonstrate their understanding of respect

- Pupils carry out 'peer assessment' in lesson, particularly English and Maths lessons in a respectful manner.
- We have a yearly remembrance assembly and the school is represented at the village service.
