Oak Class

"They grow in pumpkin patches" "They have seeds inside" The children are really enjoying forest school, learning the rules. They have made leaf kebabs and have been on an Autumn leaf hunt. The children have also really liked their PE sessions, learning about spacial awareness and running into an area where no one else is. They are being extra careful to notice where other people are too so we avoid any bumps.

Ash Class



As our first half term comes to an end, we have been thinking more about Autumn and the changes it brings. Amongst the many things we have been doing is threading leaves, creating leaf people, learning about hedgehogs and making hedgehog bread rolls.

This term in History we have been learning about Crime and Punishment throughout the ages. India enjoyed learning about witchcraft in the medieval period.
