What we have been up to in November.....

Ash Class

In literacy, we have started to plan our own story about finding something precious, drawing pictures of our ideas. In maths, we have thought about shapes, combining these to create new shapes for our pictures. In our physical development time, we have been developing the skill of rolling with a ball to hit a target. It has been a busy time in Reception this half term.



Elm Class

Year 2 have been revisiting Continents in Geography this half-term. They have also been learning about the North and the South Pole. Although both very cold, they discovered that the North Pole is slightly warmer than the South Pole! In RE, they have been exploring beliefs about what candles mean to other people. They learnt about the festival of Diwali, known as the Festival of Lights and made some beautiful paper plate diya lamps. By lighting diyas, this symbolised light triumphing over darkness.



Year 2 have also been enjoying learning about worms in Science. They made their own wormery and then found the worms!



Fir Class



Last term, Year 3 had fun reading exploring the book 'Iron Man' by Ted Hughes. During the last week of half term, the children had the opportunity to design and make their very own Iron Man!

Acorn Class

This month Pre-School have been looking at various celebrations such as Halloween where we enjoyed carving pumpkins. For bonfire night we celebrated fireworks, making rockets and firework pictures. We learnt about Diwali, the festival of lights, by making Diva pots and reading the story about Rama and Sita.



We have also have also looked at hibernation and have learnt which animals hibernate. We also learnt why certain animals hibernate and why some don't. We then made clay hedgehogs and homes for them.

Beech Class

In Year 1, November has been an exciting and busy month. We have learned about maps and created our own 'messy' maps in Geography.



In Science, we have identified objects and the materials they are made of, understanding that sometimes, some objects are made from more than one material.

We have also created our own Islamic artwork in RE, creating and putting together a collection of tiles.

This month Year 4 have started a Science unit on Electricity. They have had many practical lessons looking at how circuits work and have used scientific enquiry skills to spot errors and fix them as they arise. Our budding electricians have been great at predicting ways to improve their circuits so they can do different things. The children have also discussed electrical safety in these lessons.
